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JUNG SUP SHIM, M.D., says:

On or about March 7, 1975, I was licensed to practice medicine as a physician in the State of New York having been issued License No. 123276 by the New York State Education Department. My current address is 470 Salem Street, Lynfield, MA, 01940-2323.

I am not currently registered with the New York State Education Department to practice as a physician in the State of New York.

I understand that I have been charged with one specification of professional misconduct as set forth in the Statement of Charges, annexed hereto, made a part hereof, and marked as Exhibit "A".

I am applying to the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct for an agreement to allow me to surrender my license as a physician in the State of New York and request that the Board issue this Surrender Order.


I hereby agree not to contest the allegation and specification set forth in the Statement of Charges (Exhibit A).

I understand that, in the event that this proposed agreement is not granted by the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct, nothing contained herein shall be binding upon me or construed to be an admission of any act of misconduct alleged or charged against me, such proposed agreement shall not be used against me in any way, and shall be kept in strict confidence during the pendency of the professional misconduct disciplinary proceeding; and such denial by the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct shall be made without prejudice to the continuance of any disciplinary proceeding and the final determination by a Committee on Professional Medical Conduct pursuant to the provisions of the Public Health Law.

I agree that in the event the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct agrees with my proposal, this Order shall be issued striking my name from the roster of physicians in the State of New York without further notice to me. I agree that this Order shall be effective upon issuance by the Board, which may be accomplished by mailing, by first class mail, a copy of the Order to me at the address set forth above, or to my attorney, or upon transmission via facsimile to me or my attorney, whichever is earliest.

JUNG SUP SHIM, M.D., the Respondent, was authorized to practice medicine in New York State on March 7, 1975 by the issuance of license number 123276 by the New York State Education Department. The Respondent is not currently registered with the New York State Education Department to practice medicine.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

1. On or about July 1, 1998, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Board of Registration in Medicine issued FINAL ORDER NUMBER: 98-04-Ra determining that the resignation of Dr. Shim was in conformity with the requirements of 243 CMR 1.05(5)(a) and accepting the resignation. In Dr. Jung Sup Shin's RESIGNATION, dated June 24, 1998, he stated that he realized that the resignation was a disciplinary action which is reportable to any national data reporting agency and that he would resign any licenses that he had in any other state or jurisdiction contemporaneously with this resignation.

FIRST SPECIFICATION

HAVING SURRENDERED HIS LICENSE

Respondent is charged with professional misconduct under N.Y. Educ. Law §6530(9)(d) by reason of his having voluntarily or otherwise surrendered his license after a disciplinary action was instituted by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of another state, where the conduct resulting in the surrender of the license would, if committed in New York State, constitute professional misconduct under the laws of New York State, in that Petitioner charges:
