NIRANJAN B. PARIKH, M.D., being duly sworn, deposes and says:

That on or about March 24, 1978 I was licensed to practice as a physician in the State of New York, having been issued License No. 133969 by the New York State Education Department.

I am currently registered with the New York State Education
Department to practice as a physician in the State of New York
for the period January 1, 1991 through December 31, 1992 from
224 Lafayette Street, Williston Park, NY 11596-1516

I understand that the New York State Board of Professional Medical Conduct has charged me with one specification of professional misconduct.

A copy of the Statement of Charges is annexed hereto, made a part hereof, and marked as Exhibit "A".

I admit guilt to the specification of misconduct as charged in the Statement of Charges.

I hereby agree to the penalty that my license to practice medicine be suspended for a period of one year, said suspension to be stayed; that I be placed on probation for a period of one year subject to the terms enumerated in Exhibit "B"; and that I complete fifty hours of public service, pursuant to the requirements set forth in N. Y. Public Health Law Sec. 230-a(9), as added by ch. 606, laws of 1991.

I hereby make this application to the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct (the Board) and request that it be granted.

I understand that, in the event that this application is not granted by the Board, nothing contained herein shall be binding upon me or construed to be an admission of any act of misconduct alleged or charged against me, such application shall not be used against me in any way and shall be kept in strict confidence during the pendency of the professional misconduct disciplinary proceeding; and such denial by the Board shall be made without prejudice to the continuance of any disciplinary proceeding and the final determination by the Board pursuant to the provisions of the Public Health Law

I agree that, in the event the Board grants my application, as set forth herein, an order of the Chairperson of the Board shall be issued in accordance with same.

CHARGES

NIRANJANA B. PARIKH, M.D., the Respondent, was authorized to practice medicine in New York State on March 24, 1978 by the issuance of license number 133969 by the New York State Education Department. The Respondent is currently registered with the New York State Education Department to practice medicine for the period January 1, 1991 through December 31, 1992 at 224 Lafayette Street, Williston Park, NY 11596-1516

SPECIFICATION

Respondent is charged with professional misconduct within the meaning of N.Y. Educ. Law Section 6530(9)(a)(ii), as added by ch. 606, laws of 1991 in that she has been convicted of committing an act constituting a crime under federal law, specifically:

OnMay 25, 1990, Respondent was convicted, upon a guilty plea, in the United States

District Court for the Eastern District of
New York of violating 42 U.S.C. Section
1320a-7b(b)(1)(B) in that Respondent
knowingly and willfully received
renumeration (in the amount of \$3,700) in
exchange for ordering and arranging for the
ordering of one or more items paid for under
the Medicaid and Medicare Program.
Respondent was sentenced to three years
probation with four months home
confinement, fined \$5,000, and assessed
\$50.

EXHIBIT "B"

TERMS OF PROBATION

- That Respondent, during the period of probation, shall conduct herself in all ways in a manner befitting her professional status, and shall conform fully to the moral and professional standards of conduct imposed by law and by her profession;
- 2. That Respondent shall submit written notification to the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), addressed to the Director, Office of Professional Medical Conduct, New York State Health Department, Corning Tower Building, 4th Floor, Empire State Plaza Albany, New York 12237 of any employment and practice, of Respondent's residence and telephone number, of any change in Respondent's employment, practice, residence, or telephone number within or without the State of New York;
- 3. Respondent shall submit written proof from the Division of Professional Licensing Services (DPLS), New York State Education Department (NYSED), that Respondent has paid all registration fees due and owing to the NYSED and Respondent shall cooperate with and submit whatever papers are requested by DPLS in regard to said registration fees, said proof from DPLS to be submitted by Respondent to the New York State Department of Health, addressed to the Director, Office of Professional Medical Conduct, as aforesaid, no later than the first three months of the period of probation;
- 4. Respondent shall submit written proof to the NYSDOH, addressed to the Director, Office of Professional Medical Conduct, as aforesaid, that 1) Respondent is currently registered with the NYSED, unless Respondent submits written proof that Respondent has advised DPLS, NYSED, that Respondent is not engaging in the practice of Respondent's profession in the State of New York and does not desire to register, and that 2) Respondent has paid any fines which may have previously been imposed upon Respondent by the Board or by the Board of Regents; said proof of the above to be submitted no later than the first two months of the period of probation;

- 5. Respondent shall complete any public service requirement imposed upon him or her, prior to the completion of the probationary period, and shall submit written proof of such service to the NYSDOH, addressed to the Director, Office of Professional Medical Conduct, as aforesaid;
- 6. So long as there is full compliance with every term herein set forth, Respondent may continue to practice his aforementioned profession in accordance with the terms of probation; provided, however, that upon receipt of evidence of noncompliance with, or any violation of these terms, the Director of the Office of Professional Medical Conduct and/or the Board may initiate a violation of probation probation proceeding and/or such other proceeding against Respondent as may be authorized pursuant to the Public Health Law.

No promises of any kind were made to me. I am making this application of my own free will and accord and not under duress, compulsion or restraint of any kind or manner.

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THE COURT: I've read the sentencing memorandum of Ms. Parikh.

MR. RUBIN: I've read it.

THE COURT: Have you?

THE DEFENDANT: Yes.

THE COURT: Would you like to be heard?

MR. RUBIN: Yes, your Honor. Dr. Parikh stands before you on her plea of guilty to the same charges that Dr. Singh who we just dealt with. Dr. Parikh's involvement in this instance involves a sum of money greater than the last case.

I am not comparing the two, only to point out to your Honor that Dr. Parikh's practice involves her work with many asthmatics which caused her to use the services of the confidential informant.

There also should be known, your Honor, that the informant in this case was an individual that performed work of high quality. He was an individual whose services were appreciated by the physicians because of his good service. He delivered on time, was a reliable individual. Unfortunately, it also involved the payment of funds back to the doctors which is the crux of the crime.

Dr. Parikh has submitted letters from her patients who hold her in very high regard, in fact, who are very distraught over losing her in the community. Dr. Parikh works in the community as a physician in the Medicaid program.

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Unfortunately, unfortunately for the community, unfortunately for Dr. Parikh, she is no longer going to be able to do that. It is very unfortunate in view of the fact of the shortage of physicians in this city, especially in those areas of the city which is void of proper medical care. The doctors of Dr. Parikh's caliber are of such rarity the community is going to suffer. Dr. Parikh has dedicated herself to treating patients of that economic strata.

In addition, something I did not include in the memorandum is that Dr. Parikh also works two times a month in West Point as a physician. Dr. Parikh's family also has been caused much distress by this. She has informed her oldest child. It has caused a great embarrassment. Her husband who is also a physician has written a letter to your Honor explaining what the family is going through because of this.

We are dealing with an individual whose life has been dedicated to medicine and who now finds herself in a situation which she has only herself to blame, unfortunately, which sometimes is the most difficult to deal with. She has no one else to cause to be sorry for what she did other than herself. As a result it is the cause of much stress and anxiety.

She's not a well woman, suffers from hypertension and angina. However, this certainly has not done her any good but she is trying to deal with it the best way she can. Dr. Parikh has always lived an exemplary life. She's a devoted mother,

has dedicated herself to her children in addition to being able to maintain a medical practice. This is now lost to her.

Dr. Parikh also has been unable to secure a job with a hospital due to this conviction. In fact, from now on each and every application that she would have to write, whether it be for insurance, whether it be for job, she will have to put down not only that she has been expelled from the Medicaid program but moreover that she has been convicted for a criminal act.

Physicians, more than most people in this society, are scrutinized by employers and unfortunately this will be known to them. It is something she can not erase. Therefore, I would ask your Honor to be lenient with Dr. Parikh in view of the suffering that she's undergoing because of her acts and I would ask your Honor to impose a minimum sentence here as the law requires.

THE COURT: Would the government wish to be heard?

MR. WENIK: Nothing to add.

THE COURT: Would you like to be heard, doctor?

MR. RUBIN: Dr. Parikh has written a few words. She asked me to state them for her if your Honor would allow?

THE COURT: Certainly, yes.

MR. RUBIN: To Honorable Judge, this statement is written by me to say how sorry I am being involved in these charges. This has caused so much embarrassment to me and my family that it is beyond my words. This has caused me great

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physical and mental stress. I do have history of angina and hypertension and my health has deteriorated due to my mental stress.

I have tried to be a good, knowledgeable hard working caring doctor. All of a sudden I am a guilty person. I am already facing lots of problems finding a job in various hospitals even though I am well qualified for the position. I am taking my emergency medical boards on May 30th, 1990 at Philadelphia. I have never been involved in any kind of illegal or criminal activity before and I realize that I have now made a serious mistake. I honestly reassure this Court that I will never repeat this mistake any time in my life. I beg the Court to be very understanding and kind to me. Yours, sincerely, M. Parikh, M D.

THE COURT: Would you like to say anything further?
THE DEFENDANT: I'm sorry, sir.

THE COURT: What is emergency medical boards?

THE DEFENDANT: That specializes you in emergency medicine, work in emergency room conditions.

THE COURT: I'll put you on probation, three years probation. In order to do that I have to also direct that you have four months home confinement but without that electronic business. I'll impose a fine of \$5,000 and a special assessment of \$50.

MR. RUBIN: Thank you, your Honor.

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
